

Reading activities

After you have read your book, choose one of these activities to complete. Try and pick a different activity each time.

Factual books – books which have real information

What are 3 interesting things you learned from reading your book? Draw a picture of the 3 things you found most interesting.

Can you think of 2 more things that you now want to know about this topic? Write them down.

Write 3 questions to ask someone in your family about your book. Ask them the questions and see if they are correct.

Story books

Your book needs a new title. What is it? Remember, the title has something to do with the book and must be interesting enough for others to want to read the book.

Now make a new cover for the book.

Find 5 great adjectives from the book and write them in your own sentences.

Who do you think is the most interesting character in the book? Why are they the most interesting?

If you could give the main character some advice, what would you tell them? You could tell them how to fix something, what to do in a situation that has happened or what they could do better next time.

Pretend you are a character from your story and write a letter about the adventures of the story to a friend.

If you could ask the main character 3 interesting questions, what would they be? What are the answers to the questions?

Write a new ending to the story.

Write a letter to Mr Norman and Mr Morris and tell them about the book you have read. Make sure you write about the main character, the problem of the book and how the problem was solved.

Make you own bookmark. Draw the main characters, the problem of the story and how the problem was solved (ending).

Find 10 interesting words from your story and create your own find-a-word.

Draw pictures that retell your story. Remember to show in your pictures the beginning, middle and end of your story.
